This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

## Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At KS3 students follow the national curriculum for Music delivered through singing, composing, performing and writing music on the staff. Our schemes of learning are informed by the model music curriculum, and students receive 1 hour per week across KS3 of music curriculum lessons. All students of all protected characteristics follow the same music curriculum, and are supported by Teachers and Teaching Assistants where necessary to enable them to access the full range of musical instruments and curriculum content and skills.

In KS3 lessons students have the opportunity to perform solo as well as in a group ensemble once per term. Students have regular access to piano, percussion instruments, guitar and ukulele, as well as composing on music software. Students will use these instruments in a variety of musical genres including samba, reggae, rock, pop, classical, film music etc.

At KS4 we offer AQA GCSE Music delivered 5 lessons per fortnight. Students cover the three strands of composing, performing and appraising music. Further information about the specification and assessment requirements for this course can be found via the following link:

## Part B: Music Tuition and Ensembles

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Students can study a variety of instruments through a mixture of external and internal providers. Students can study 1-1 music lessons for instruments such as voice, brass, woodwind, drums, guitar, bass, strings etc.

There are several music ensemble opportunities for students. Students can access a variety of ensembles to support students studying any instrument which have several performance opportunities. Our ensembles include choir, senior orchestra, folk group, music tech club, KS3 singing club. Students have the opportunity to make use of resources outside of lesson by rehearsing in their own chosen bands during any break, lunch, or after school. Students can use any instruments within the department and can loaned selected instruments to support 1-1 music lessons.

NB: Students are able to take a taster lesson before committing to signing up for drum lessons.

All ensembles are free for students to attend. Students should check their enrichment poster in their form room or on our school website to see whether they are able to attend a particular ensemble.

We have two practice rooms which are available for student use during social time and after school.

## Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

We annually alternate a school musical with a Bound in Sound concert. Our school musical involves a live band to play the music and will draw on all our ensembles. The Bound in Sound concert gives the opportunity for students to play in the prestigious Chester Cathedral with our Frodsham and Villages School Partnership schools. At the end of every academic year, we organise a Summer Showcase in which students are welcome to perform at to showcase the excellent musical accomplishments made throughout the year.

Students also have several other performance opportunities throughout the year internally and as part of the wider community. Ensembles are invited to perform at community events such as the Frodsham Christmas Festival and Ho Ho Helsby as well as community parties held on site. Students are also invited to perform during rewards evenings, induction evenings, and assemblies etc.

Students will be invited to perform in these events when part of ensembles. If a student would like to perform as a band or soloist at any event, they must speak to the Department Leader for Performing Arts or Music Subject Leader.

All of our events are charged at approximately 3 pounds per ticket for audience members. Proceeds go towards supporting future concerts and productions as well as the school's charity fund.

All of our events are supported by our local music hub.

## In the future

We are committed to improving student participation across our ensembles and future performances which support internal productions, concerts, as well as community events.

In the future we aim to build a culture in which students are proud and passionate of their participation in music ensembles and performances. We hope that students recognise the importance and benefits of studying music as well as taking part in ensembles.

We are working closely with primary schools to support students in their transition to high school and helping students to adjust to the different processes in studying music at high school.

We endeavour to provide opportunities for students to gain music experiences through trips to support their music education and promote interest.
